Adjectives:

An **Adjective** is word that describes persons, places, or things.

An **Adjective** usually answers one of three questions about the noun or pronoun it modifies (describes).

What kind? Please use the drawing paper.

How many? Wanda has three sisters.

Which one? That seat is taken.

Adjectives usually come before the noun or pronoun they modify.

Articles & Proper Adjectives:

Articles are the **Adjectives** *a*, *an*, and *the*. *A* and *an* are **Indefinite Articles** and *the* is a **Definite Article**.

Possessive Pronouns, such as *my* and *our*, can be considered **Adjectives** because they modify or describe nouns.

Similarly, possessive forms of nouns, such as *Roger's* and *the captain's*, can also be considered **Adjectives**.

A **Proper Adjective** is formed from a proper noun and begins with a capital letter.

For Example: Cervantes was a Spanish writer.

The Korean restaurant is very popular.
