Most visitors head to the West End. Others to the City. Entry points to London by air include London City Airport, Heathrow, Gatwick, Stansted & Luton. A Travelcard allows you a return trip to London by train together with travel on the underground and buses. Main rail terminals include King's Cross, Paddington (former home of Great Western Railways), Waterloo, Victoria, St Pancras, Euston, Fenchurch Street and Liverpool Street (former home of Great Eastern Railways). Tourist musts include: a double decker bus tour or a journey across London on a Routemaster red Double Decker bus. Also a journey on the London underground – visit Bank underground station on the central line and hear "Mind the gap." Go for a trip in a London cab. Sample a pint in a traditional London pub. Do look out for the 'Congestion Charge' if driving!

Traditional sites to see include: London Bridge, Tower Bridge and The Tower of London. Buckingham Palace, The Mall and 10 Downing Street. West End musts to visit are Oxford Street, Tottenham Court Road, Regent Street, Bond Street, Charring Cross Road, Leicester Square, Piccadilly and Trafalgar Square. Other places to visit in London include: Covent Garden, Harrods in Knightsbridge, The National Maritime Museum at Greenwich, London Zoo, Hampton Court Palace (try the maze) and Kew Gardens. Also the London Dungeons and Madame Tussauds. Mayfair and Chelsea. The East End where you can get a great curry! Notting Hill – the carnival, the film! Wimbledon, the common and the tennis club. There is the London Eye. How about a trip to the British Museum, the Tate Modern or the National Gallery? See the Houses of Parliament and Big Ben. Hamley's (for toys). Westminster Abbey, St Paul's Cathedral or the Cabinet War Rooms. Visit West End Theatre's and cinema's. Also the London Transport Museum or the Victoria & Albert Museum.

A trip to London (V1) – 14th October 2008

Hidden gems to see in the city of London include the former Metropolitan Railways arcade opposite Liverpool Street. Also Leadenhall Market. Famous streets include Bishopsgate, Gracechurch Street, Threadneedle Street, Old Broad Street, Cornhill, Lombard Street and Cheapside. There is the historic St Swithin's Lane (do visit the old barbers!) or Popeshead Alley. The city has changed. Many old retail bank branches are now wine bars or pubs. Famous London parks include St James, Regents, Green, and Hyde Park. Take a trip on a riverboat. Dine in the West End. See the Royal Observatory (GMT – meridian line), the Cutty Sark and the old Royal Naval College in Greenwich. Walk across the Millennium Bridge. Go to Wembley stadium, Richmond Park, Canary Wharf, Docklands, or visit the future London Olympics site. Famous London markets include Petticoat Lane, Spitalfields, Portobello Road (Notting Hill), Camden, Greenwich, Borough (Near London Bridge tube station) and Brick Lane (East End – back of Liverpool Street) for market stalls, bars and curry!

Why not visit Somerset House? Or go for a walk along Southbank. Famous London football clubs include Arsenal, Chelsea, Tottenham Hotspur and West Ham. There is the BBC, Capital and LBC! Also Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, Carnaby Street – famous 60's fashion street. Soho – bars & sex shops. London clubs. See the Albert Hall or HMS Belfast. The London Planetarium. Twickenham Stadium – Rugby. The O2 and Wembley Arenas. You can read the Evening Standard or TNT, ninetofive and other giveaway free magazines at stations. See the River Thames, Regents Canal, The Dartford River Crossing/Tunnel or The Serpentine. Visit Hampstead Heath or Highgate Cemetery. See Nelson's Column and Whitehall. Lord's cricket ground. The Oval. The M25! Turn detective and visit The Sherlock Holmes Museum at 221b Baker Street. Famous towers include the BT Tower (formerly the Post Office Tower), Tower 42 (formerly the NatWest Tower) & the Gherkin. Travellers might also like to use Victoria Coach Station (for long distance journeys) or Victoria Bus Station (for London Buses). Neither is Victoria train station. Well, these are some of the things you can see in and around London. There are many more but you'll just have to find them and see them for yourself. Enjoy London!

START
